Public Policy Update

It is hard to believe, but we are almost a month into 2022. What does this mean for AAUW Public Policy and our advocacy for the issues? We did enjoy several legislative successes at both the state and federal level over the past year, but the basic priorities remain the same. Briefly they include:

Economic Security - AAUW advocates for all women to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

Education & Title IX - AAUW supports a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity, including vigorous enforcement of Title IX.

Civil Rights - AAUW advocates for equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society.

The National AAUW website includes an area <u>Where We Stand</u> that provides more detail and quick-facts pages on key public policy issues. Pages are undergoing updates, so check it now, but also check back over the course of the month for new information. We can use the information

through February 2nd. There are two proposed changes to the bylaws. The first relates to the nominations for the board and the second relates to the date for which a new member is eligible to vote. Unfortunately to me and many of you, we will not see a proposal for a more open membership on our ballot this year. I reached out to our IL AAUW president to share with her that we are looking for this to be brough up again sooner rather than later. I suspected it was not coming up soon as it is going to take some strategy on the part of the new CEO and board to make it happen and we have not heard anything about it. I did want you to be aware. Donna Jean was very understanding and asked me what she can do for us... I said to please keep this topic of a more open membership on the table. Feel free to comment on the proposed bylaws changes via the AAUW link provided.

ing curbside voting permanent, setting up voting centers on Election Day where anyone within the election's jurisdiction could vote, regardless of the precinct of their residence and making it easier for people to permanently receive a mail-in ballot. The legislation also moved this year's March 15 primary to June 28. The measure also marked the general election date of Nov. 8, 2022, a state and school holiday, as it was last year. Be sure to participate in both the primary and general elections.

One other item is the "Equal pay days." The exact dates are still being determined, but we will be looking for innovative ways to share information on them.

Agent of Change

This prestigious award is presented annually to an active member of AAUW-IL. The Nominee should be an outstanding member who has actively promoted change within the AAUW organization or local/national community.

Selection of the best candidate for the award will be based on the candidate's actions or level of support for one or more of the following activities:

- Identifying or bringing attention to a societal problem that disproportionately affects women and girls,
- Addressing a problem related to the economic security or professional advancement of women,
- Addressing an issue related to gender equity or diversity in public education or equal access to specific occupations,
- Taking action related to civil rights or social justice issues affecting women and girls,
- Taking actions that improve the ability of a state or local affiliate of AAUW to address issues of gender equity and civil rights with the community,
- Taking actions related to mission-oriented issues that raise the visibility of AAUW in the local community or at large.

Nominations may be initiated by any Branch member, Branch Board of Directors or Branch President. Multiple members may be nominated from a single Branch. Branches are encouraged to resubmit nominations, if their nominee was not selected for the Agent of Change Award that year.

A committee of the AAUW-IL Board of Directors will review the nominations. The Agent of Change will be announced at the Annual State Convention held each spring.

In the art world women are underrepresented and undervalued. <u>Only a third of artists</u> represented by commercial galleries are women and women working in arts professions are paid on average <u>74 cents to every dollar paid to men</u>. This is what motivates AAUW to host an annual art contest—to give women artists the attention they deserve.
