It's 1932, along the banks of Minnesota's Gilead River. Odie and his brother Albert are orphans confined to the Lincoln Indian Training School, a pitiless place where hundreds of Native American children, forcibly separated from their parents, are sent to be educated. Forced to flee after committing a terrible crime, Odie, Albert, their best friend Mose and a brokenhearted little girl named Emmy steal away in a canoe, journeying into the unknown and searching for a place to call their own. With the feel of a modern classic, *This Tender Land* is an enthralling, big-hearted epic that shows how the magnificent American landscape connects us all, haunts our dreams and makes us whole.

Online Program: The Weird & Wonderful World of Mary Roach - with Author Annalee Newitz Wednesday, March 1 7 - 8 p.m.

Experience an entertaining and hilarious evening with *New York Times* best-selling science author Mary Roach - despite her claim that "people call me a science writer, though I don't have a science degree and sometimes have to fake my way through interviews with experts I can't understand!" Roach will discuss her frank approach to science, the importance of humor and explore the weird, wonderful world in which we live.

Dubbed "America's funniest science writer" by *The Washington Post*, Roach has explored topics from the curious lives of human cadavers, packing to visit space, the afterlife, the alimentary canal and more. Roach claims to have no hobbies, but enjoys bird-watching, hiking, playing scrabble and watching late-night Animal Planet.

The Legacy of May Watts March 24, 10:00 - 11:30 a.m. Online program through the Morton Arboretum

What does it mean to be an older woman working in conservation? Join this lecture at The Morton Arboretum and celebrate the lasting influence of May Watts, one of the twentieth century's great conservationists, and explore what this legacy means for women today who are seeking to make a difference.

May Theilgaard Watts, the beloved naturalist, writer, poet, illustrator, and educator, was an influential figure in conservation, and she completed her most important conservation work in her later years. Watts began teaching at The Morton Arboretum in her late forties, where her tireless work engaging others with the natural world had a ripple effect that still influences the Chicago region 80 years later. When she was age sixty-six, her classic book, *Reading the Landscape*, was published. In her seventies, her dedicated activism led to the creation of the Illinois Prairie Path, a rails-to-trails program that continues today.

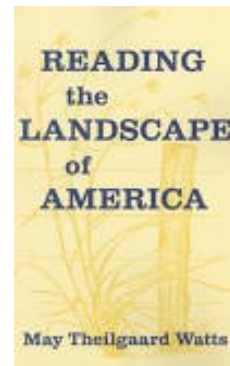
In a field historically dominated by men, May Watts made a mark advocating for conservation and inspiring future generations to take up the work as naturalists, writers, and educators. No matter what your age or gender identity, you'll be inspired by Watts' story.

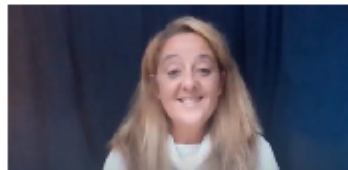


Public Policy Update- Ken Olson

I hope everyone has had a better start to the New Year than Congress, especially the House. The GOP has been battling with itself since taking control of the House and threatening the country with a shut down of the Government if they don't get their way on deep cuts to domestic programs. It seems sure to be a bumpy two years at the federal level. It will be important to make our voices heard in support of AAUW Goals. The members of Congress who represent our area in the House and Senate are supporters of AAUW Goals. We need to thank them and show our support for their efforts and encourage support by other legislators.

Two major issues for the coming year are publishing of the ERA Amendment so that it can officially become part of the constitution and continued work on Equal pay. Attorney Nicole Vorrasi Bates explains the urgent status of ERA and the need for the President to publish the amendment immediately.

The other issue is the continued fight for equal pay. We need to soon be making plans for how we can raise awareness of the issue. The overall Equal Pay Day this year is Wednesday Mar 15, 2023. - o [“Salary Range Transparency Reduces Gender Wage Gaps”](#): The factsheet discusses how salary range transparency helps reduce gender pay gaps and helps support businesses' bottom line. It also discusses states that have recently passed pay transparency laws.
- o [“Progress in the States for Equal Pay”](#): In the past few years, lawmakers have introduced equal pay legislation in over two-thirds of states and many of these bills have become law. In this updated fact sheet, we discuss different types of state legislation passed across the country.

One issue that we advocated for last year, that was not completed, and will be coming up this year is “Sunsetting the Invest in Kids Act.” Vouchers that divert money from public schools to private schools, which the Invest in Kids Act does, are opposed by AAUW IL Statewide public policy and our branch. Lets hope that 2023 brings good health, good times and positive policy outcomes.

We are so grateful for your support! Through the Holiday Store, we provided 115 families with 1,364 gifts, and have plenty more to refresh some of the items within our Housing and Children's Program.

This year there were so many special moments, and I would like to share a couple of them with you. One mom, Monica, had to reschedule her pickup time from 11am to 4pm. Then at noon, one of our mom's had an extra tree (it was white with gold ornaments) and she gave it to us in case anyone needed it. We tried giving it away all day. Then Monica came, we asked if she needed one and this is what she said, *"God has answered my prayers. My daughter has been asking me to get a tree and I told her I could not afford one, but here one is for us. I was even thinking, if I could get a tree, it would be nice to have a white one as our new place is gold and white and it would look nice. Thank you!"*



Then I received a touching email from another one of our moms, Vicki* saying, *"I picked up my bags and honestly, I have no words to tell you how grateful I am. I'm crying right now and thanking everyone at WINGS for this. I'm sorry I didn't pick up my things earlier, Covid hit my daughter and me really bad. We were sick for three weeks (I'm still coughing) and I couldn't borrow my brother's car. Anyway, I just wanted to thank you. I thought that I came to pick up a stuffy or something that I could give my daughter and was surprised to see so many things. Just to tell you how important the things you do are... last night I couldn't sleep because I was too cold (we're staying in an attic and the heating is not very good). We have a child blanket and a sheet so I obviously give the blanket to my daughter, and today I got a nice warm blanket and I know I will sleep much better. We also now have a towel each to dry (I only had a small one), body wash, lots of toys, and games. I can't say thank you enough. THANK YOU!!!"*

AWARD PURPOSE

AWARD CRITERIA

- Recipient is an active branch member at the time of nomination.
- Nominations may be initiated by any branch member, branch board of directors or branch president. Multiple members may be nominated from a single branch.
- Branches may resubmit previous nominations if their nominee was not selected for the Agent of Change award that year.
- Nominee should be an outstanding role model who has actively promoted change within the AAUW organization, local or national community. The actions or contributions of the nominee do not have to enrich the branch directly. The nominee's contributions can be directed toward community efforts that support the mission of AAUW.
- The accomplishments of the nominee demonstrate a commitment and dedication to the mission of AAUW. Recipients will be selected based on their commitment to bring about positive societal change in accordance with the current or immediate past AAUW mission of advancing gender equity:
 - Advancing women in leadership
 - Fighting for fair pay and economic equity
 - Removing bias from education.
