We know from AAUW's research (and probably some personal experience) how student loan debt holds women back in particular. Women's reproductive health access was impacted by the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization decision. It seems that the state legislation that is being proposed across the country after this decision is further limiting access to women's health care. These two issues illustrate the benefit of and need for the advocacy and research that AAUW provides.

In the coming several months we will have a lot on our plates. Our welcome meeting on September 14 will give us some insight into being a Ukrainian refugee. We are working on scheduling a call with Gloria Blackwell, the president of AAUW, to celebrate our 5 Star Status. We will soon be considering where we would like to send our educational funds. Those who have ever attended the luncheon at lamb's farm will be able attest to how meaningful the AAUW scholarships have been to furthering women's education. In November we will be able to make our voices heard by voting. Knowing this group, we will be educating ourselves on the issues and the candidates at all levels of government. Ken continues to be an excellent source of state and national information important to AAUW members.

I am looking forward to celebrating our progress and advocating for equity for all women with you this coming year. Note that Sept. 21 is equity pay day for African American women. Church's debut will likely strike a chord, especially with women who find that not has changed in our patriarchal society since Meri's time, and that Meri's story might well be their own.


Please join me for the discussion of this interesting book which takes you back to a time we all can relate to.

PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

As we look ahead to the fall and the new AAUW year, what lies ahead on the public policy front? Both the US Congress and the Illinois Legislature are on a break as I write this, so it is a good time to look at what has been done and what is still needed.

The recent sessions have been very productive at both the state and federal level. In past articles we've highlighted a bit of what has been done in the state level, in particular the state budget that has provided increases in year-to-year spending on Education, Healthcare, Human Services, and Public Safety. We need to continue to support these positive trends that are important for reaching AAUW Goals now and in the future. Illinois is a stalwart in protecting reproductive health care for women. This needs to be supported and continued.

At the Federal level both Congress and the Administration have been active. <u>The Student Loan Relief for</u> <u>Borrowers</u> that was just announced by President Biden addresses one of AAUW's major goals of making college more affordable. The administration has also taken steps that it can to improve access to health care for all and reproductive care for women, to control inflation and protect the environment. What has Congress Done? Congress has passed H.R.5376 [117th] - Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, H.R.3967 [117th] - Honoring our PACT Act of 2022, H.R.3684 [117th] - Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and H.R.1319 [117th] - American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, to name just a few. They are very large bills in words and dollars, but address inflation, health care, roads, bridges and airports, internet access, research, jobs and more. Some passed with bi-partisan support, while others were with only Democratic votes. If you would like more details, I invite you to visit <u>https://www.congress.gov/</u>.

We are now moving rapidly into fall and the mid-term elections. Ads are already becoming very noticeable. At the state level we will be voting for Governor, other state officers, all members of the Assembly, some state Senators and more. One additional item will be an amendment to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution known as the "Workers Right Amendment". It provides that employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours, and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. It was passed by both chambers of the legislature and if it receives 60% or more of the vote in the fall, it will become part of the Illinois constitution.

At the National level, Senator Tammy Duckworth and all members of the House are up for election. We are non-partisan, but it is important to elect candidates at the local, state and national level who are committed to protecting the right to vote, protecting access to healthcare for women and all, providing family and medical leave, addressing gun violence, supporting public education, protecting the environment and working for justice and equity. That is a long list for priorities, but be sure to vote and make your voice heard. We can and will make a difference.



Upcoming Equal Pay Days

Equal Pay Day symbolically denote how far into the year women must work to be paid what men were paid the previous year. The date is based on the latest U.S. Census figures. Started by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996 and publicized by AAUW, the goal of Equal Pay Day is to raise awareness about the gender wage gap. Because the pay gap varies significantly among different communities, Equal Pay Days have been added to the calendar and several remain to be recognized. This reflects that fact that many women must work far longer into the year to catch up to men. These are the remaining dates for 2022.

Black Women's Equal Pay Day is September 21. Black women are paid 58 cents for every dollar paid to white men.

Native Women's Equal Pay Day is November 30. Native women are paid 50 cents for every dollar paid to white men.

Latina's Equal Pay Day is December 8. Latinas are paid 49 cents for every dollar paid to white men.

Editors Note: Read the book that all of Arlington Heights is talking about - *Clark and Division* by Naomi Hirahara. One Book, One Village (OBOV), now in its ninth year, invites the community to read the same book at the same time and share in the experience through related programs and book discussions. I checked with the AHML and you can register for virtual programs to discuss this book even if you live in another community. On site discussions might be limited.

Set in Chicago in 1944, *Clark and Division* is a meticulously researched historical fiction and gripping mystery set against the backdrop of World War II and the incarceration of Japanese Americans in internment camps. Aki Ito and her parents have been released from Manzanar, an internment camp, where they had been detained since the aftermath of Pearl Harbor. The Itos resettle in Chicago, where Aki's sister Rose moved months earlier. On the eve of their arrival, Rose is killed by a subway train. The police rule Rose's death a suicide, but Aki refuses to believe her sister would kill herself and so she delves into Rose's life in Chicago to learn the truth of her death.
