President's Message

I recently took a course on risk communication at work. It was very interesting to learn that facts don't change behavior. Changing someone's feelings changes behavior. In hindsight, it makes sense. How many of us have family members who use their phones while driving. You can tell them the statistics about crashes due to distracted driving and they don't change their behavior. However, if they know someone who has gotten into an accident, it changes their feelings about using their phone while driving.

How might we apply this concept to the issues important to AAUW members? When talking about equal pay day, we have a lot of facts at our fingertips, but should we be talking about how someone's daughter is making less than her counterparts or that she doesn't seem to have the same opportunities for advancement because she is a parent. When speaking about Title IX with a neighbor, are there opportunities to talk about the differences in athletics for their daughters compared to their sons. Do you have stories from your own lives that could compel a conversation about these and other important issues? I sure do. I could talk about my sixth-grade teacher who wouldn't recommend me for advanced math in seventh grade because I didn't socialize with the other girls in my class. Or my college advisor who told me I should be a nurse rather than an engineering. I encourage you to think about your stories and begin changing minds and behavior with personal activism around why the issues that AAUW advocates for are important and change lives. - Genevieve

Public Policy Update, Ken Olson

Well, election day is almost here. Thanks to Mary and Lynn for providing an excellent program on misinformation and some of the ways it is being created and used in our election. Certainly, a good prep for our voting.

I know that many of you have joined me and millions of others in voting early. As of October 25, the Illinois Board of Elections shows that a total of 1,422.768 early votes had been cast in the state. Of these 797,725 were early in-person voting and 625,043 were mail-in ballots. If you haven't voted yet, please do and encourage any friends and family who have not yet voted to do so as well. It is one important way to make our voices heard. In addition to voting our Branch has done an excellent job of communicating with our state and federal elected officials. We need to keep it up. We will be watching the coming State Veto Session, the Lame Duck session and then early next year the legislature for opportunities to encourage them to support legislation that aligns with AAUW priorities.


We do hope that after November 5 the rhetoric of the campaign season will be toned down. Unfortunately, because of the support on one side, I expect Project 2025 to continue in the news. One interesting item from outside the normal political world is that Melinda French Gates recently announced a \$250 million global open call to support women's mental and physical health around the world through <u>Action for Women's Health</u>. Eligible organizations serve women and have a track record of improving women's mental or physical health. They should center equity in their approach and be poised to scale their work to strengthen the health of more women. Each awardee will receive flexible funding between \$1 million and \$5 million USD. It will be interesting to follow this and see the impacts in coming years.

Celebrating Women—Dec 9 at 1pm Kathy/Peg

A discussion of the iconic Lilly Ledbetter, who recently passed at 86, will be **Monday, December 9 at 1PM on Zoom.** She's described by Deborah Vagins, director of Equal Pay Today, as an ordinary woman "who sparked a movement and changed the face of pay equity forever". Links to videos and interviews of Lilly for you to review will be sent later in November.



Also, in the spring we plan to discuss two books, *That Librarian: The Fight Against Book Banning in America* by **Amanda Jones**, a middle school librarian in Watson, La., who spoke out against censorship by Christian Nationalists in her community and faced a backlash, including death threats. The book is available at libraries, bookstores and online hardback and an eBook.





The second book is *The Vegetarian*, by South Korean author Han Kan the 2024 winner of the Nobel Prize for literature. It tells the story of a young woman who decides to give up meat, but the story turns into so much more according to an NPR review. Originally published in 2007, it was published in English in 2016, so it's available in libraries and bookstores. You may want to read both books or chose one, but there's plenty of time between now and spring. Happy reading!

Enjoy your beautiful fall and gigantic pots of mums.



with Sally Field playing Tova. Three of us went to hear the author speak at the Schaumburg Library in September. I can't wait to share everything I learned at the presentation. Fran




The Women by Kristin Hannah January 20 at 1PM

This novel is an intimate portrait of coming of age in a dangerous time and features an epic tale of a nation divided during the Viet Nam War that several of your loved ones may have served in, including my husband. This book reveals the powerful contributions and sacrifices of the American military nurses who served in a cruel war whose agencies refused to acknowledge that they were even there.

It begins with nursing student Frances McGrath joining the Army Nurse Corps after her brother ships out to serve in Vietnam. Not only did she have to deal with the chaos and destruction of the war each day, she had to deal with the divided, protesting, angry, America when she got

home. The ending is a tribute to the heroism of the brave nurses who unselfishly served in this unpopular war.

The Dinner by Herman Koch February 17 at 1PM

An internationally bestselling phenomenon: the darkly suspenseful, highly controversial tale of two families struggling to make the hardest decision of their lives - all over the course of one meal.

It's a summer's evening in Amsterdam, and two couples meet at a fashionable restaurant for dinner. Between mouthfuls of food and over the polite scrapings of cutlery, the conversation remains a gentle hum of polite discourse - the banality of work, the triviality of the holidays. But behind the empty words, terrible things need to be said, and with every forced smile and every new course, the knives are being sharpened.

Each couple has a fifteen-year-old son.
