
#### Dust Child

#### PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

The US Congress has been on their August reveto session in October, so there has been little crisis of some type in the news virtually every has been the result of Executive orders and ac-

cess and the Illinois legislature is in recess until the recent legislative action, but it still seems there is a day. Much of the "action" since the first of the year tions rather than legislation.

In case you are unfamiliar with executive orders they are not legislation; they require no approval from Congress, and Congress cannot simply overturn them. Legislation may be passed that make it difficult, or even impossible, to carry out the order, but only a sitting U.S. President may overturn an existing executive order by issuing another executive order to that effect. As of August 27, President Trump had signed 196 executive orders, 47 memoranda, and 81 proclamations since the start of his second term. It's no wonder if we feel overwhelmed as this is about three times as many as past presidents.

Looking at the past eight months there have been attacks on DEI, the Department of Education, health care, reproductive rights, research, indiscriminate (or in some cases targeted) removal of federal employees, controversial appointments and more. One major piece of legislation, HR1 (the Big, Beautiful or Bad, Bill) was passed on a party line vote. This lays the groundwork for implementing many controversial actions.

What is AAUW doing in response? AAUW writes letters to members of Congress, endorses coalition letters that align with our member affirmed Public Policy Priorities and issues Press Releases to demonstrate our strength as a collective behind important policy issues impacting women's access to education and economic security. You can find letters, releases and the "Two Minute Activist" on the <u>AAUW website</u> in the <u>"Take Action" section</u>. We also have a Lobby Corps that visit members of Congress on a regular basis to lift up AAUW Priorities. We were also a partner in the "Good Trouble" demonstrations.

What can we do? Increase our personal awareness and that of others about what is really happening. Get and share information from trusted sources rather than rumors. We do have several AAUW or AAUW endorsed webinars designed to provide useful information on political action coming up that you may want to attend. The AAUW IL Fall Conference to be held virtually on Sept 27. The title is: "Policy Impacts on Women and Higher Education: Learn, Plan, Act". Plans are to include a panel discussion, breakouts etc. to come up with action plans.

We also have Webinars that will be hosted by the Jane Addams Branch:

Sept 19 - Paid Medical and Family Leave - Sarah Labadie, of Women Employed, will share the ups and downs of getting this complicated legislation passed. Developing and passing legislation is how we get AAUW values working for everyone.

Oct 10 – Introducing the updated <a href="https://ilga.gov/">https://ilga.gov/</a> website, this is the site for contacting your legislators, seeing legislation, filing witness slips and much more.

What else is there? Be sure to be part of the AAUW Action Network, submit "Two-minute activist" letters and Illinois witness slips. We will have at least one branch meeting focused on Illinois' actions and AAUW IL is planning for an AAUW Lobby Day in Springfield.

Thanks for being involved, we can and do make a difference.

## AAUW Awards Over \$5.3 Million to 228 Women Scholars and Community Projects for 2025-2026

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — AAUW proudly announces our new AAUW fellowships and grants recipients for the 2025-2026 academic year. "For more than 100 years, AAUW's fellowships and grants have opened doors for women to lead, innovate, and thrive," notes AAUW CEO Gloria L. Blackwell. "This funding is not just support—it's a catalyst for change, especially for women of color and those in STEM who continue to face systemic barriers. I am inspired by this year's recipients and excited to see how their work will shape a better future for us all." Our 228 outstanding awardees have been granted a projected total of \$5,312,656 to support their academic and professional goals.

The 2025–2026 awardees reflect the diversity, resilience, and academic excellence that define AAUW's mission:

- 67% of American Fellows, 54% of International Fellows, 42% of Career Development Grantees, and 85% of Selected Professions Fellows identify as women of color.
- Up to 65% of awardees across multiple programs are first-generation college graduates.
- Up to 65% come from or lead single-parent households.
- Science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) remain a strong focus, with up to 73% of fellows in these fields, depending on the award type.
- International Fellows represent 33 countries, with continued growth from underrepresented nations, including our first fellow from the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Community Action Grantees are implementing change in 16 states, with 80% promoting STEM equity for K-12 girls. AAUW's longstanding commitment to empowering women in higher education and professional fields remains unshaken in the face of the current pervasive dismantling of educational equity in America. "Despite ongoing challenges," says Blackwell, "AAUW continues to stand firm as a lifeline for scholars navigating political headwinds. We will continue to persist in the face of academic backlash because all women deserve equitable access to education."

Applications for the 2026–2027 academic year will open on August 1, 2025.
